about dion parson

Born in the United States Virgin Islands on June 11, 1967, **Dion Parson** is an American jazz drummer, bandleader, composer and educator from St. Thomas. Given the strong presence of jazz and music festivals where he grew up, an interest in fusing jazz with Caribbean music was unavoidable for him. Originally playing the trombone, Parson picked up drums when he was 15. He studied music at Interlochen and Rutaers. obtaining a bachelor's degree in music education and a master's in jazz performance. As a developing artist, Parson developed foundations in classical, jazz, pop, regade, calypso and African music. His graduation from Rutgers helped him get started in New York City, where he worked with Monty Alexander, Ray Anderson, Dwayne Burno, Don Byron, Marc Cary, Laurent de Wilde, Donald Harrison, Ernest Ranglin, Justin Robinson, David Sanchez, Ron Blake and Reuben Rogers. Parson worked with the Broadway production of The Color Purple starting in 2006 and co-founded the organization United Jazz Foundation (UJF) with Steve Coleman and Branford Marsalis in 2007. In 2021, he officially joined International Jazz Day as a partner.

In addition to live performance, he has also had a successful studio career, recording his first album as a bandleader in 2000 entitled *21st Century*. Dion co-founded the 21st Century Band in 1998 and has been featured on dozens of albums since. His music is a true fusion of all the various Caribbean styles, serving as a diary of all the cultures present in USVI (United States Virgin Island).

Using his music education degree, Dion devotes his time to educating aspiring young musicians in the Virgin Islands and throughout the Caribbean to learn more about their cultural heritage and become competent artists and creators in the process. Founded in 2012, Parson's nonprofit United Jazz Foundation seeks to identify, educate and mentor USVI students interested in pursuina a career in music. UJF offers an interdisciplinary music curriculum for students, using culture to boost self-confidence and academic achievement. As Chair of the Communication and Performing Arts Department of the University of the Virgin Islands, Parson is shaping the studies and careers of a new generation of USVI arts professionals at the university level. He has also taught at Rutgers University, Cheyney University, North Carolina University and Harlem School of the Arts. In addition to UJF, Dion was integral to the inception of CJI (the Caribbean Jazz Institute), a 10day intensive covering jazz repertoire, ear training and music theory. He also built Mentoring through the Art of Music, which is a program built around free masterclasses and instrument donations from Parson to Caribbean schools. Parson makes sure to visit each island five times a year to see the program through.

Batter Head

Also called a drum skin or resonant head, the batter head is the membrane of an acoustic drum that a drummer strikes to make sounds. For millennia, batter heads were made from animal skins, but most of today's drum skins are made from a plastic composite

Buleador

One of the most recognizable Caribbean instruments, specifically when playing Bomba. The Buleador is a large wooden drum responsible for keeping rhythm

Cabasa

A type of African shaker made by wrapping metal chains around a wooden cylinder

Drum fill

An intentional break from a drum groove that provides a transition into a new measure or section. Drum fills often showcase a player's ability on the instrument

Fusion

A genre of music that blends elements of two or more styles together to create a new sound

Guiro

An idiophone made from a dried gourd and typically played by rubbing wooden sticks or wire brushes against it

Polyrhythm

A passage of music that combines two time signatures. For example, a drummer may play a 4/4 pattern on their kick drum but a 3/8 pattern on their closed hi-hat

Steelpan

A Trinidadian percussive drum with chiseled concave grooves that produce different pitches

Tambourine

A percussion instrument that consists of a solid, round frame inset with metal disks, sometimes with a drum head stretched across the frame
