about rufus reid

Rufus Reid is a prolific jazz bassist, composer and music educator. Born in February 1944 in Atlanta, GA, Reid was raised on the West Coast in Sacramento, CA. He was a trumpet player in his youth but went on to pick up the bass, his signature instrument, during his time in the U.S. Air Force. Reid studied bass under James Harnett from the Seattle Symphony. He also received his bachelor's degree from Northwestern University, where his mentors included Warren Benfield and Joseph Guastefeste.

He spent the early 1970s playing professional jazz in Chicago. In 1974, he wrote and published his seminal music craft book, *The Evolving Bassist*. During this time, he also played with jazz icons such as James Moody, Dizzy Gillespie and Curtis Fuller, and recorded with Dexter Gordon, Lee Konitz, Kenny Dorham and many others. In 1976, Reid moved to the East Coast and became highly influential in the New York City jazz scene, where he collaborated with Thad Jones and Mel Lewis, performing and recording with their quartet and orchestra. Reid has recorded over 500 albums, including dozens as a leader and several with TanaReid, a group he co-led with drummer Akira Tana.

Reid is a well-respected jazz educator with decades of teaching experience for universities, arts institutions and workshops. He was the director of William Paterson University's Jazz Studies program from 1979 – 1999. Since retiring as a university professor, he has continued to teach at Jamey Aebersold Jazz Camps, the Stanford University Jazz Workshop, the Richard Davis Foundation for Young Bassists and Ravinia's Stean's Institute for Young Artists. Reid was the founding director for NJPAC's *Jazz for Teens* Program from 1998 – 2001 and an instructor for NJPAC's Milt Hinton Institute for Studio Bass, an immersive week of bass classes, performances, small ensemble work, studio sessions, lectures and workshops on the Montclair State University campus.

Rufus Reid's Quiet Pride: The Elizabeth Catlett Project is a five-movement suite composed, arranged and conducted for a 20-piece orchestra. The work pays homage to Elizabeth Catlett, an African American multimedia artist. The album received recognition from the GRAMMY® Awards with nominations for Best Large Jazz Ensemble and Best Instrumental Composition. Reid said of Quiet Pride, "My purpose in recording Quiet Pride: The Elizabeth Catlett Project was to create a definitive, professional recording for people who love art and who love music. It will also be an excellent educational tool as I continue my residencies and performances at colleges and universities internationally. Quiet Pride has enriched my life about what I do and why I do it."

vocabulary

Bandleader The leader of a musical group, such as a jazz ensemble

Bassline

A low-pitch instrumental line played by an instrument in the rhythm section

Double Bass

The largest and lowest-pitched stringed instrument featured in jazz ensembles and symphony orchestras. It is sometimes called the upright bass or acoustic bass

Improvisation

The practice of spontaneously creating melodies through chords, time signatures and harmonies that are determined in the moment by artists

Jazz Ensemble

A band of jazz musicians who perform on various instruments, including bass, percussion, horns, and sometimes a vocalist. Jazz groups range from a trio or quartet to a big band or jazz orchestra

Pizzicato

A plucking method of playing a stringed instrument

Sideman

A professional musician who performs live with a soloist or group
